Foreword

It is said about the Walgett grey clay soil that “if you stick to it in the dry, it'll stick to you in the wet”. Nothing is truer at the moment. Walgett is the epicentre of this current drought. However, our community remains strong and focused on the future. Resilience and working together, while being proud and friendly, is in our veins.

Where else in Australia can you go to the Newsagent, have a great coffee with gourmet food in a Secret Garden, then buy fishing gear, a gun, the newspaper, kid's toys and a birthday card all at the one spot? Where else does a drought- stricken community pull together and raise \$200,000 for a sick toddler? Where else does the Show Society and community put on its biggest and best show EVER after seven years of drought, when neighbouring shows are being cancelled?

We are the gateway to the only black Opal Mine? in the world. David Bowie made a music video in one of our pubs! We sit at the joining of the Barwon and Namoi Rivers as they make their way to the Great Australian Bight. We have some of the best fishing in the world, and the most picturesque ski holes in the country. All of this is over-looked by Scar Trees and other Aboriginal artefacts that are hundreds of years old. Did you know that Baiame, the Aboriginal creator of God was born here, between Lightning Ridge and the Narran Lake? Speaking of the lake, did you know when the Narran is dry they grow wheat, chickpeas and sorghum on it? Or that our grain goes into the Walgett Silos which is the largest silo complex in the Southern Hemisphere?

We are important too! The Northern International flight beacon is located here. We have a diverse community; almost 50% of us are of Aboriginal heritage. 60% of us are aged under 45! Having such a diverse community means we have access to a wide range of local and visiting medical specialists. Helping us to avoid travelling huge distances and waiting times. Our population has dropped from 2300 to 1700 in the last five years, but we can guarantee every one of them is proud and pleased to live in Walgett.

Some people say it cannot be done, but it can be done in Walgett. And it will be done. Afterall, what other town has had to re-build their supermarket twice due to fire in five years? We are proud of our town, but to the wider public, Walgett is shadowed by a reputation it gained in the 1980s. Walgett became a town that was dangerous, boarded up and to be driven through quickly. We want to change this perception. We want to highlight our long and diverse history. If we are able to showcase Walgett and ALL it has to offer, we can encourage people to stop and stay a while. To spend tourist dollars in our town. Tourism will support our economy and is not dependent on the weather. Tourism helps keep our resources both built and natural or future generations.

We want friends, family, visitors and newcomers to join us for Sunday Sippers at the Sporting Club after Barefoot Bowls for years to come!

Our Story



The northern NSW community of Walgett is a significant and vast pastoral and farming district which stretches to the Queensland border. It is located 640 kms by road from Sydney at the junction of the Kamilaroi and Castlereagh Highways, and situated at the confluence of the Barwon and Namoi Rivers. With a current population estimated at 1700 persons, it is the administrative base for the Walgett Shire and its overall population of 6100 residents.

Prior to non-Indigenous settlement beginning from the 1840s, the Walgett district was inhabited by the Gamilaroi, Yuwaalaraay, Waiylwon and Ngemba Nations. A post office was gazetted in 1851, town surveyed in 1859 and the railway arrived in 1908. The town's boom years were the latter 1880s when the town of Walgett was the highest navigable point on the Barwon and known as 'the key to the back country'.

Walgett is located on the productive black soil plains of NSW, with agriculture being the primary industry of the district with a heavy reliance on dryland farming and grazing. It has

a reputation for its wool, beef cattle, chickpeas, barley, fat lambs, sheep production, cotton, canola and wheat. 1.5 million hectares of crops are grown in the shire. Walgett is the home to largest silo grain silo complex in the Southern Hemisphere.

The Walgett Aboriginal Medical service and Walgett Shire Council are the two significant employers in the town. The town also serves as the 'Gateway to the Opal Fields' being on the key entry road to the Lightning Ridge, Grawin, Glengarry and Sheeppark Opal Fields. Its riverside location makes it a popular fishing destination, especially for Murray Cod and Yellowbelly. Tourism is an emerging and significant industry sector for the community.

Our community is at the mercy of the climatic seasons. This in turn impacts our business opportunities, population & overall social and economic conditions. Our community retains its strong sense of pride in its diverse heritage, stunning landscapes, and contribution to the national economy.



Our Vision

The town of Walgett strives to promote and improve quality of life; enhancing a sense of community, and preserving the integrity of our small-town identity and heritage. Community participation and collaboration from our citizens is encouraged.

We seek sustainable growth that protects our natural and historic resources.

We are committed to fostering respect, values, hospitality and culture.

Our Goals

Community Goals are broad statements of intent that direct our efforts towards accomplishing our vision in line with our guiding principles.

Below are the seven community goals which guide our community aspirations, namely -

- To retain families in the shire by continually strengthening our livable rural lifestyle and local employment opportunities.

- To actively promote and showcase our community as a great place to stop, stay, experience, and reside, especially through a vibrant and welcoming town centre.
- To support, promote and celebrate active community participation and volunteerism.
- To retain strong sporting and cultural clubs, competitions, facilities, and traditions.
- To facilitate opportunities and experiences that build upon local assets and the capacities and creativity of all community members.

Our Challenges

Like many small inland rural communities, our community faces, and needs to respond creatively to, a series of demographic, social, economic, and environmental challenges. A prolonged drought period has had a devastating impact on the economy, population and business base. The population base has declined from 2300 to 1700 in the last five years. The drought has exhausted community members. The town has also been consistently ranked as one of the most socially disadvantaged areas in NSW.

Our residents identified the following as priority issues that cannot be ignored, and require creative community responses:

- An ageing and declining population, contributing to the weakening of social networks and community cohesion.
- Water security; high economic and employment dependence on agriculture and water availability.
- Two river systems with different water regulations and filtered drinking water.
- Volunteer fatigue, declining numbers and dependence on a few proactive community members.
- Loss of service clubs e.g. Lions, Rotary.
- Community appearance; bland look of main street and lack of appeal.
- Tired signage.
- Tourism challenges; seasonal nature and limited tourist product.
- Business loss and service gaps.
- Massive shortage of childcare options.
- Levels of intergenerational poverty.
- Cultural divisions that contribute to community fragmentation.
- Poor education and employment outcomes for many young people.
- Limited local employment opportunities.
- High summer temperatures.
- Lack of collaboration and integration across human service providers, and service duplication.
- Attraction and retention of suitably qualified staff.
- High government department staff turnover.
- The cycle of intergenerational trauma and unemployment.
- High levels of drug, alcohol, and gambling addiction.
- High levels of domestic violence and mental health issues.
- Limited opening hours at the youth centre, swimming pool and bore bath.
- Lack of a Youth Safe House, detox, and rehabilitation facilities.
- Limited after-hours youth recreation activities.
- Negative media exposure.
- Lack of rental accommodation.
- Lack of community appreciation for the importance of agriculture.
- Proximity of larger regional centres that act as 'Sponge Towns' drawing services and employment.

- Planting of trees to develop more shade.
- Constructing new artistic seating utilising aboriginal designs and heritage materials.
- Installing bollards and flag poles.
- Improving curbing and guttering.
- Improving car park arrangements.
- Refreshing signage.

Timeframe: Immediate and ongoing

3. Foster greater 'street life and welcoming feel' through

- Supporting more business activity on pavements.
- Introducing more main street community events.
- Fostering more alfresco dining and café life.
- Improving shop frontage.

Timeframe: Immediate and ongoing

4. Develop a Public Art and Heritage Strategy that incorporates

- Sponsoring new public street art including a 'Sculpture and Mural Trail' incorporating metal sculptures.
- Restoring and painting of heritage buildings.
- Introducing heritage streetscape photos as part of new interpretative signage.
- Replacing or repainting planter boxes with artistic designs capturing local heritage and culture.
- Planting trees.

5. Assist the Walgett Historical Society to create a new farm machinery display area at the rear of the Museum.

Theme Four

Youth Retention & Attraction

ACTIONS



1. Formulate a 'Youth Retention and Attraction Plan' that focuses on

- Enhancing meaningful and active child and youth civic engagement, including community enhancement projects in the CBD and at the river.
- Increasing youth recreation options, especially non-sporting options and afterschool activities.
- Extending the Justice Reinvestment model to find new ways of working with young people.
- Building upon the new PCYC facility to provide a comprehensive integrated youth service.
- Identifying local youth training and jobs options including extending the council's current school to work initiatives and traineeship initiative.
- Identifying youth leadership opportunities and providing them with a voice.
- Maintaining regular contact with young people after they leave the community.
- Implementing a campaign to target the return of the 25-40-year-old cohort.
- Converting Youth Advisory Council to Youth Action Council, including provision of budget.

Timeframe: Immediate

2. Introduce activities through the schools that build active citizenship and opportunities for Walgett young people to identify and implement what they care about, drawing upon programs that have been utilised in other small towns; namely-

- 'RuMAD?' - Are You Making a Difference? (Bank of I.D.E.A.S.)
- 'Community Minded Kids' (Community Minds)
- 'Dream Seeds' (Youthrive)

Timeframe: Short term

3. Focus on expanding youth lifestyle and employment opportunities provided by the \$7 million investment by the NSW Government to the PCYC facility.

Timeframe: Immediate to long term

4. Introduce regular Aboriginal youth 'Back to Country' camping experiences.

Timeframe: Immediate to long term

5. Investigate and instigate other youth recreation options especially related to greater use of the Pool, Bore Bath, parks, skate park, youth centres and youth spaces.

Timeframe: Immediate to long term

6. Explore new agricultural education options at the Walgett Community School, especially related to dry land farming, sustainability, agricultural tourism and bush tucker, and the use of pastoral technology and robotics.

Timeframe: Short term

ACTIONS

1. Instigate a 'Walgett Pride Campaign' incorporating positive Walgett stories to address outdated negative images of Walgett and generate more community pride and engagement. See the 'Give Me Geraldton Any Day' Campaign
 2. Continually upgrade local parks as key green spaces for the community to gather and enjoy, and add to the visitor appeal of the town- equipment, trails, seating, yarning spaces, outdoor gym, coffee van, child safety fencing, community gardening, include the creation of a 'Sunset Deck' on Gilwarry Rd.
 3. Instigate regular initiatives that develop, celebrate, and recognise local leadership and volunteerism and active citizenship.
 4. Enhance facilities at the showgrounds to attract more regional events, including the grandstand, toilets, fencing, seating, shade, signage, carpark, and entrances.
 5. Establish a Childcare Task Team to explore options to deal with the massive shortage of childcare options in Walgett.
 6. Undertake audit of services, identify gaps and actively promote business gaps.
 7. Develop a 'Lifestyle Promotional Campaign' to attract new residents including -
 - Initiating an internet and print media campaign.
 - Creating a 'Welcoming' committee and kit.
 - Instigating a calendar of 'Back to Walgett' & school reunion events.
 8. Undertake a 'Community Skill and Passion' Audit' of local residents and organisations.
- Timeframe: Immediate and ongoing**
9. Enhance the community garden with healthy living programs and bush tucker plantings.
 10. Develop a Walgett Housing Strategy incorporating the following components -
 - Increasing stock and diversity of housing, including rental options.
 - Adapting housing for the climate.
 - Improving energy efficiency.
 11. Develop and support food and water security initiatives.
